Ebola appeal

Our appeal to support children orphaned by Ebola closes this summer. Over £10,000 has been raised as we go to press and is being sent to the 'Children of Hope Foundation' in Sierra Leone to support those in need. A final total will be given at our circuit service on 6th September.

So far at least 121 children in the Kailahun District who lost parents as a result of Ebola have been reached with help. Travelling to the remote areas of the district is difficult but it is hoped to reach all the areas where help is needed soon. Please pray that Ebola remains under control and that the number of new cases in the country declines. Thank you for your support for this appeal.

An introduction to Ministerial Development Review

Ministerial Development Review (MDR) is an annual process designed to support ministers both to grow in their ministry and to contribute to circuits and districts in their mission. It does so by providing a framework for ministers to engage in reflective practice in the context of their current appointment and by enabling and encouraging discussion, development and growth.

MDR applies to all Ministers (Deacons and Presbyters) in a Circuit or District appointment, and to all District Chairs and those in Connexional and other appointments.

The process of MDR involves each Minister meeting, each year, with a Lay Contributor (a member of a local church) together with an Ordained Contributor (for Ministers within a Circuit, usually the Circuit Superintendent, and for the Superintendent, the Chair of District.)

This meeting is an opportunity, prayerfully and reflectively, to:

- review together the minister's work over the past year, in the context of their current appointment, and against any hopes and goals set and recorded at the previous meeting – noting successes, challenges, changes in circumstances and learning;
- identify together new hopes and goals for the coming year in the context of Circuit / District / Connexional priorities
- identify together areas for **learning and development** to support the Minister during the coming year.

This process may sometimes involve nominating other individuals who have knowledge of their ministry to feed into the process by responding to feedback questions.

I am very grateful to those folk who serve as Lay Contributors in this Circuit. It is an important role and one which I know is appreciated by the ordained staff. Thank you too to those who, from time to time, are invited to offer feedback on a particular aspect of a Minister's vocation and work. As we all seek to "Grow in Christ" this way of supporting and watching over one another in love is important and highly valued.

Freedom, Freedom, Freedom!

It seems a long time since September 2007 when I finished working for the Connexional Team in London and started working part time, from home, in the York North Circuit assisting the minister at Huntington and Thornton-le-Clay.

I believe everyone is called to something and that call is constantly being honed. My call is simply to set God's people free using my life skills, my training as a technical illustrator/graphic designer and my experience over two decades working alongside circuits and churches in the UK and Ireland with a mission focus.

What I do now is part of the ongoing shaping of my call, constantly evolving as I share my journey of faith with the folk of Huntington, Thornton-le Clay and now Poppleton and Southlands where by journeying together we constantly find God in the unexpected.

Huntington's refurbishment allowed the After 8 Band to develop its unique style of multi-media café worship that has taken us around the circuit and to Manchester. Cell groups and a healing ministry have emerged- a testimony to build on a firm spiritual foundation taking the whole church forward in mission, another adventure with God.

At Thornton-Le-Clay, a small membership have discovered the possibilities of using limited resources and facilities in outreach through Alpha and a Bible study group. Taking a fortnightly assembly in the small village school led to the setting up of Messy Church in 2011 attracting between 30-44 folk. The help and skills from some of the folk from Huntington have contributed to the success of this venture- a great example of churches working in partnership.

More recently the circuit has expanded my role to include Southlands and Poppleton mission initiatives, as well as Poppleton's RUACH project.

My Circuit Pastoral Assistant's role is varied, sometimes slow, occasionally frustrating but often immensely rewarding. Helping people in their journey of faith takes time. It is a very privileged position to have and for that I am deeply grateful to those who are sharing the journey with me. Someone once asked me to define success- as I see it, we all work together for one changed life, a deepening of faith, in which we rejoice and give God the glory. Jesus said, "If you hold to my teachings, you are really my disciples. Then you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free".

Acomb Jubilee Project

Acomb celebrated the 50th anniversary of its church building and 270 years of Methodism in Acomb last year. It was also the point we were able to unveil our vision for the future. Starting with a survey in 2013, and in conversation with other local churches, local government officers, charities and individuals we have drawn up a vision for mission which encompasses broadening our worship, offering new community events, deepening our spirituality and renewing and developing our premises. Our building was already urgently in need of repair, but we held off on all but the most pressing of those repairs until we had our vision in place.

New worship and hospitality are at the heart of the internal changes to the building. We plan to significantly increase the size and visibility of the side entrance with a new external courtyard. By expanding into the present choir and office spaces we will create a new café and reception area. This new area will offer visibility down our long corridor, but also widen the entrance to the sanctuary.

We also plan to move the main hall forwards, so that it is accessed off this new vestibule and within these spaces, as we do today, we'll offer new family friendly worship alongside Messy church. The hall has also been configured so it can act as a community cinema, and storage is being rationalised.



Alongside these visible changes, we'll be replacing our defunct gas boiler, with a new high energy efficient zoned system and double glazing throughout, which along with increased insulation will cut our heating costs by around 40-50%. Sadly the Ground Source Heat Pump solution we were pursuing was not viable due to iron salts in York's water.

Finally, a previously neglected wilderness area at the rear of the church will be brought to life with a new landscaped garden, an insulated all year round log cabin and summerhouse and a garden room extension to the main building which will replaced the present stage area in the hall. This will have a patio area leading out to this new quiet garden space.

We hope this new garden space will be used as a retreat space, a community garden and the base for our new Northumbrian community worship. We also hope to process the produce from the garden to aid the local food bank and other local charities.

We have made good progress already in pursuing these new opportunities. Over £50K has been raised. The side garden is now used, and the rear halls double glazed, and projection facilities installed. The rear garden has been cleared, levelled, marked out and plants are merrily growing. The new boiler will be installed during the late summer. We are presently working up the final architect's plans for the planning authority and circuit and district approval and hope to present them soon.

Circuit Property Advisory Group

The Circuit Property Advisory Group was formed earlier this year to advise the circuit council on property schemes proposed by churches, and to seek to provide help and advice to church property stewards. It is made up at present of Revd. Leslie Newton, Tim Duffy, William Swires, Peter Harrison, Angie Creswick and Lois Cross. Malcolm Parker will be joining us in the autumn.

So far we have met as a group twice, with discussions including:

• Property schemes being developed at Acomb, Central, Melbourne Ter-

race, Poppleton and West Thorpe (among others);

- A visit to Southlands to advise on building concerns;
- How to assist stewards in getting the best value for property maintenance and utilities;
- Developing and sharing skills and knowledge across the circuit to help with property matters;
- Planning a training and get-together session for church property stewards for Saturday 3rd October, 10am-12 at Lidgett Grove. If you're interested please put the date in your diary!

We hope to continue to offer advice and support to churches thinking about property projects, and to expand the help we can offer property stewards.

Unusual Visitors in Church

It's always good to be able to welcome first-time visitors to church, and that's what the congregation at Poppleton were able to do one Sunday morning not long ago.

One visitor was a friend of a couple who worship regularly at the church. They had invited their neighbour to come with them – a lovely act of quiet evangelism. She had come along and, despite being rather hard of hearing, was made very welcome and was given a personal greeting by a number of people.

Poppleton welcomed other visitors that same morning. Some had six legs: they were stick insects. Others had long ears and whiskers: a pair of fluffy rabbits. Some visitors had two legs and feathers: a pigeon and a quail, each in their own private travelling cage. About nine or so had four legs and hairy coats: these were the dogs, in various shapes, colours, and sizes ranging from Chihuahua through Sheltie to Cocker Spaniel.

It was a Pets' Service. The idea of holding a service for people and their pets was mentioned some time ago, and the Discoverers, the Poppleton Sunday morning young people's group, were enthusiastic.

The readings, hymns, prayers, and the PowerPoint[®] pictures all reminded us of the huge variety of creatures in God's wonderful world. We thought together about how God wants us to care for them, and how our pets can teach us about love and responsibility as we look after them. We were all introduced to the pets one by one, including the ones represented by pictures (for the animals that didn't travel well and couldn't be there in person). The pets themselves were beautifully behaved; some dogs joined in singing the hymns and commented on the service from time to time. At the end, the animals gathered at the front of church with their owners for a prayer of blessing.

Afterwards there were even more conversations than usual as adults and young people chatted together about the animals. Clearly some of the pets present reminded some of the older folk of the ones they themselves had looked after in past years.

"When can we do this again?" more than one person asked afterwards. I wouldn't be at all surprised if people decide to hold another Pets' Service at Poppleton next year.

Thank God for an experience everyone both learned from and enjoyed!

Aroma

Aroma Coffee Shop in Haxby is quite unusual as many of you will know. It was started by Haxby & Wigginton church in 2008 as a means of outreach to the community, to provide good quality coffee and lunches in a friendly informal setting, and as a means of promoting interest amongst local people in church events and the Christian religion.

Whilst much of what it serves and seeks to achieve isn't unique amongst church cafes, it is unusual in that it is open 6 days a week from 9 to 5, it employs six staff as well as using the services of up to 60 volunteers - and it is in a location remote from the church which sponsors it.

From the beginning we have felt God at work in what we do. We have been successful financially, recycling profits into the community each year, but more importantly we have undertaken numerous outreach projects from the shop.

For example we have run a significant number of evening courses, classes and meetings which between them continue to cater for different needs in the community, such as a support group for the carers of people with dementia; we have held occasional short services at certain times of the year and coach trips and free afternoon tea on Sundays for those who would otherwise be alone.

The interesting difference over the last 6 months has been the opening of strong 'coffee shop' competition in the form



of Costa across the road. This has reduced our footfall somewhat, with the result that we have less profit to give away this year than previously. But our business model is sound, our staff and volunteers are wonderful and most of our customers remain very loyal.

So we go forward in faith, as convinced as ever that God is leading us on and in early May we served our 200,000th customer. We have reached this milestone in six and a half years and York Press and Vale Radio were both happy to feature it for us.

We look forward with enthusiasm to the next six and half years and beyond, and perhaps to our half millionth customer.

If you would like to join us as a volunteer you don't have to be a member of Haxby & Wigginton church or indeed even resident in the community or a committed Christian. We'd love to hear from you whatever your circumstances and however much or little time you may have to spare. You could help take food to tables, clear away, wash up, bake cakes (almost half of the cake we sell is homemade) or perhaps a small job on the admin side. If you'd just like to be a customer and enjoy a terrific coffee in convivial surroundings whether or not you've visited us before, then we'd love to see you too!

Circuit Council report 17th June 2015

-The new Vision statement was received and agreed. A Vision Coordinating Team will be established to take forward how this is to be implemented.

-The Circuit Invitation Committee has appointed supernumerary ministers to work part time to care for churches where a minister has not been stationed: Clifton: Revd David Godfrey; Trinity: Deacon Cedric May.

-Sue Swires, Philip Turner and Andy Lindley will be taking their sabbaticals in the next year, and arrangements will be made to provide care for their churches.

-Sally Gall was thanked for her work over the last year as Senior Circuit Steward. Christine Stephenson will be Senior Steward from September, and two new circuit stewards– Sue Gill and Rosemary Freeborn– will join the existing team (Tim Duffy, Martyn Holman, Carol Parker, Peter Metcalf).

-Plans and grants for several property schemes around the circuit were approved.

-Past cases review: a report was circulated concerning the Connexional review of past safeguarding cases. Recommendations have been made by Connexion and we are likely to see the effects over the next few years.

-A new Circuit Safeguarding group is to be formed to oversee safeguarding issues.
