Dear Friends,

As Christmas 2015 approaches we can't help but recognise again what a 'big deal' this festival remains in our culture. Shops have been stocking presents and decorations for months already, and TV producers are busy making their Christmas specials. Despite all the commercialism and materialism that for many is the main feature of Christmas, we recognise that this season does offer a rich opportunity to our churches to connect with our communities and point to the heart and wonder of Christmas: Love come down in Jesus Christ.

This year, however, we have a particular opportunity to remind the world of an important part of the Christmas narrative. How can we not be particularly touched by the reminder that the infant Jesus was himself a refugee – part of a family who fled for safety? (Matthew 2:13-15)

Hopefully you will have seen the Circuit's press release and news updates on our website as we seek to respond to the Refugee Crisis. Many churches are now displaying the '#refugeeswelcome' banners which unite us with other faith communities and groups in saying clearly that we want to offer welcome and hospitality to the refugee. Thank you, too, to churches who are raising money to send to the agencies offering support.



We wait to hear whether the offer of the Ilton Garth Manse as a home for a refugee family will be accepted by the Council as they consider the most appropriate way to house the few families that York is likely to receive in the coming few months.

The Circuit has also written to our local MPs and supports the lead The Methodist Church has given nationally, alongside ecumenical partners, in challenging the Government to be more generous and ambitious in its offer of hospitality to refugees.

Much later in Matthew's gospel (25:34-45) we hear the challenge that Jesus offers: "I was a stranger" Did we invite him in or not?

May we this Christmas have open hearts to receive afresh God's love come down in Christ AND open hearts to truly welcome all – friends and strangers – in His name.

The expectation is that new Action Groups will be formed to pursue particular pieces of work.

We look forward to seeing the photos of blooming crocuses in the Spring as we trust God for the coming to life of our Vision Statement as the year unfolds.

At the September Circuit Council it was reported that the Circuit Invitation Committee was submitting a profile for a Probationer Presbyter to join the Staff Team in September 2016 with pastoral care for Clifton and Trinity churches. We are pleased to report that we have been informed that this profile has been accepted as suitable for the initial stationing of a Probationer. This means that we can expect to receive the name of a Probationer Presbyter matched to the Circuit in January 2016. A visit by the person will be arranged shortly after to meet with the local churches and the Circuit Team.

Shared Wisdom

In May, Adelaide Morley and I designed and ran a series of 6 sessions, which we called, "How to Live a Good Old Age", to give an opportunity to a group of 11 older people to discuss various topics, share their own experiences and think about the issues raised.

To enable people to come, it was important to provide transport. Meetings began at 12.30 with lunch and discussion started at 1pm, whether or not people had finished eating.

The titles for the 6 sessions were: How do I keep in touch when all around seems alien? How can I keep doing, when I am told I am past it? How do I make myself heard and understood? How do I continue to grow in faith, when I can't get to church? How do I talk about my death to my family? and What do I need to hold on to and what do I need to let go of? When planning, we were realistic enough to know that those attending the groups, may have other ideas as to what was important to them, making the subject for each session simply a springboard to discussion that could go anywhere.

The first week's topic was a great icebreaker, as we discovered the panic encountered at supermarket checkouts, with forgetting pin numbers and anxiety over packing bags quickly enough, with impatient people in queues, making things much worse. The distraction caused by ipads, ipods and phones when family visited was commonly felt, not because of the technology itself, but because it restricted conversation and heightened loneliness. The clear message was, 'put technology away and focus on the one you are visiting.' Over the weeks, we were told that hearing was a major difficulty, both at church and home: hearing preachers and readers and taking phone calls. Encouraging speakers to speak more slowly and clearly, rather than more loudly helps. Pastoral visitors can have a key role in the faith of older people but the group were disappointed that, often, they were not even offered a prayer. All the group expressed a desire for someone to read the Bible to them.

By the last week the group were beginning to talk about solutions to some of the anxieties they had discussed and to think about some of the changes getting older meant they needed to make, as well as planning for the future.

As the group had jelled so well, it was decided to continue meeting at lunch time once a month, with the new name: "Shared Wisdom" where we continue to discuss relevant topics that really matter.

Nurturing Relationships

Many will know that the Methodist Church in Sheriff Hutton is just across the road from the County Primary School; this has led to friendly cooperation existing between the two of us with the School having occasional services and activities for pupils and parents in our premises.

In 2014, changes at the School meant that staff numbers were to increase by four. An approach was made to the Church Council requesting that these extra cars be allowed to use the parking area to the rear of the Church premises. Whilst we were more than willing to agree to this, it was realised that the arrangement needed to be governed by a legal agreement.

After some time, involving discussions with the legal departments of TMCP and North Yorkshire County Council, conditions were agreed; a formal document was produced and signed. This provision is not only helpful to School staff but the local community as it avoids an increase in street parking. It was also endorsed by the Parish Council as some residents had raised concerns about traffic congestion related to the School.

Methodist Women in Britain (MWiB) Partnerships 2013 - 2015

During the past two years I have been the District President of MWiB and as part of that role I have supported two Partnerships, both part of the work within the Methodist Church.

MWiB is currently working in Partnership with the Church of North India to focus on discrimination and treatment of millions of Dalit people around the

world. In particular we in the District and Circuit have raised money to provide residential places to support girls' access to, and retention in, education. With a hostel place the girls are able to live close to their school, sleep on a bed not the floor, use a toothbrush not a twig and have regular nutritious food.

Thank you for the £6000 we have raised in this District towards this work. The home based Partnership was supporting the initiative of MHA in providing free music therapy to residents with dementia. MHA has developed a national music therapy programme and have a team of trained and professional music therapists. Thank you for the additional £6000 raised in the District to provide instruments and sheet music needed for this life enhancing experience.

Circuit council report 16th September 2015

-The meeting agreed to send letters of greeting to a number of people, including the families of Revd Graham Haslam and Revd Jean Thompson, who had died since the last meeting.

-Revd Sue Swires will be on sabbatical from January to March 2016. Revd Philip Turner and Revd Andy Lindley are taking sabbaticals later in the year.

-It was recommended that Revd Rory Dalgliesh was re-invited for a further five years to work with the church in Heslington and as chaplain to the University of York. The meeting affirmed the re-invitation.

-Refugee crisis: the meeting discussed what should be our response to the crisis, in co-operation with ecumenical and civic leaders. It was agreed to delay the sale of Ilton Garth Manse so that it can be offered to the council to house a refugee family when some arrive in York. Banners declaring that refugees are welcome will be made and distributed to all churches— this is a chance for the church to show leadership in our communities.

-A new circuit safeguarding group will be made up of Revd Ian Hill as chair, the safeguarding trainers and Lois Cross as secretary.

-Circuit AGM: the AGM held in July 2015 at Robin & Margaret Jackson's farm was a great success and very enjoyable. Plans for the 2016 event are already being drawn up.

-4 new local preachers are starting training in the Circuit along with 3 new worship leaders. The new training course 'Worship: Leading and Preaching' has been introduced from September 2015 with changes to the way trainees are mentored.

Secretary for the Lay Employees Management Group

The Lay Employees Management Group (LEMG) are looking for someone to act as secretary to the group, which meets three or four times a year. This would involve taking notes of the meeting, assisting the chairperson with agenda items and general co-ordination between the members of the group, including the District Lay Employment Advisor.
