

Dear Friends,

SABBATICAL REFLECTIONS

Many of you will know that I recently returned from Sabbatical leave – ironically, on so-called 'Freedom Day'.

Because of the restrictions, I wasn't able to do all I intended, but, even so, the opportunity to be away from the usual demands and pressures was very valuable. Indeed, not being able to do all that I intended meant that there was even more space, which was probably a good thing.

'Sabbatical' obviously derives from the Old Testament principle of the Sabbath, and it is important to recognise that Sabbath observance was only part of the outworking of that principle.

Sabbath is about being kind to ourselves and to the whole of creation.

It is about not squeezing the last drop from ourselves, from those around us, from the animals and the fields.

Part of the purpose of a 'Sabbatical' is not only to rediscover that principle but to learn to value it and so continue to make space even when the usual busy-ness returns.

This has hopefully been one of the positives of 'lockdown' (although, sadly, not for those in the front line of healthcare and other essential services). Many people who have had a little more 'space' in their lives are determined not to return to the pre-Covid treadmill.

And so it is in the Church: ministers and lay people are wary of returning to doing so many things that we lose any time just to 'be'.

September is when many church activities begin afresh, but I do urge you to think carefully about what is truly valuable and what we might do differently or not at all, perhaps to leave space for new things to flourish.



THANKSGIVING FOR TRINITY

The weather on Sunday 30 May 2021 proved to be dry, warm and sunny! This was a great relief to those concerned with organising the Thanksgiving Service held at Trinity on that date. Not only did this help to brighten up what could easily have been a sad occasion, but it allowed those present to enjoy informal fellowship outside the building after the service itself concluded.

This was the first Methodist service to be held in the building since the start of the Covid-19 pandemic, and also the first since the Trinity church family made the difficult decision last year to cease worship. For the time being, the building continues to be used for services by the Ark Church (with whom we have shared the building for the last few years).

Because of uncertainty over Covid-19 restrictions, it was a difficult task to determine how many people would be able to attend the service while maintaining safe and sensible levels of physical distancing. In more normal times such a service would ideally have been a large gathering of those involved with Trinity over the years but, given the circumstances, this was clearly impossible. As a result, sadly, some who wished to attend could not do so.

Nevertheless, we at Trinity received many messages from around the York Circuit and beyond. We'd like to thank all those who sent good wishes, encouragement and promises of thoughtful prayer; they were (and continue to be) much appreciated. The service was live-streamed on the day (for which we owe thanks to our friends in the Ark Church) and,

at the time of writing, the service is still available to view on YouTube.

Music has always formed an important part of the life of the church here and, although we were unable to sing hymns, we were able to hear the organ played by Andrew Thomas before and after the service. Andrew's playing has enhanced our worship greatly over several years and it was fitting that he was able to take part on this occasion.

We were, of course, able to listen to recorded music. It was particularly good to hear the introit "Lead me Lord", which was used regularly in the past at Trinity. The hymns chosen were:

For All The Saints (StF 745)

- remembering the past service of so many at Trinity;

Beyond These Walls of Worship (StF 547)

- reminding us that the church reaches far beyond the bricks and mortar of buildings;

Lord For The Years (StF 470)

- speaking to us of our continuing Christian journey.

The service was led by our Minister Revd. Dr. Keith Albans, who welcomed all those in the building and those who would be watching the service virtually through the live-stream. We were also very pleased to welcome back two former Ministers of Trinity; Revd. David Jones and Revd. David Godfrey. These



two shared the preaching, speaking on 'Church as Buildings', 'Church as People' and 'Church as Mission' - again affirming the Christian life beyond the church building and looking forward positively to the future.

After the formal service we continued the thanksgiving outside in the sunshine and a special commemorative cake had been prepared.

The Monkgate site has nearly 120 years of Methodist history to celebrate, and it would clearly have been impractical to do justice to every aspect of this wide and varied Christian life in such a short time. Given the circumstances under which the service had to be planned, and the difficulties presented by the various restrictions, we feel that the occasion went well and provided a suitable conclusion to this part of our story.

We rejoice in all those who have served Christ in this place over the years, all the activities that have taken place here, all the community outreach based in the building and the far-reaching influence of the

church community over the years. As previously stated in writing about the story of Trinity, I feel I can do no better in conclusion than quote some well-known words from Joseph Hart's hymn:

*"We'll praise Him for all that is past,
and trust Him for all that's to come."*

CIRCUIT COUNCIL MEETING: JULY REPORT

TRINITY

The meeting noted that the final service of Trinity Methodist Church was held on Sunday 30th May. Peter Kitchin, on behalf of Trinity, thanked the Circuit and everyone for their support.

KAIROS CIRCUIT

Subject to the forthcoming Methodist Conference, the new Kairos Circuit will be established and will begin on 1st September 2021, with Rev Andy Lindley as the Superintendent. More information is available on its website at www.kairosmovement.org.uk.

CIRCUIT DIRECTORY

A new Circuit Directory will be circulated for September.

CIRCUIT STAFF

Changes in lay Circuit staff were noted, with Liz Spain moving away, Louisa Taylor having been appointed as Local Pastor at Acomb and the roles of Digital Development Enabler and Creative Content Assistant extended by six months (until end April 2022).

FINANCE REPORT

Nick Dawson spoke to the finance report and highlighted that the deficit from the 1st and 2nd quarters was turned around in the 3rd quarter. The Circuit will, however, run a deficit of around £70K for this year, but this is still better than the £100K deficit that had been budgeted for. This is part of the agreed strategy to use some of the reserves to fund Pastoral and other lay Staff. Thanks were expressed to churches for their assessment contributions.

PROPERTY ISSUES

A report on Property issues was received and a checklist of Data Protection actions and policies was noted.

DISTRICT SYNOD

Representatives to the District Synod were appointed. John Middleton was appointed as Chair of the MTM group and Vic Paylor as Chair of the Manse Committee. Tim Duffy and Sally Gall were thanked for their work as the previous chairs of these groups.

DIGITAL STRATEGY

The Circuit adopted a Digital Strategy, with the principles of providing diverse forms of worship and ministry; a new format for the Circuit Plan to address pre-pandemic issues; expand new forms of engagement and provide pathways into faith; provide training and support for digital activities. The costs involved in the strategy are envisioned to be £20K for equipment and £24K for salaries, with the money drawn from the Mission and Development Shipton Fund and £13.7K Covid recovery grant received from the All Churches Trust Fund. Pilot activities will take place to help churches work out what will be helpful for them.

DUNNINGTON

It was noted that on 22nd April the Dunnington Church Council resolved to begin the process of requesting to cease to meet. There is a possibility that work will continue ecumenically with St Nicholas Church in the village with whom there is an LEP, and discussions are ongoing as to how to keep the Methodist identity.



WELCOME NEW LOCAL PASTOR LOUISA!

Hello! My name's Louisa and I've been recently appointed as Local Lay Pastor at Acomb Methodist. I'll be working alongside Revd Andy Lindley and taking a lead in different aspects of the church's life, with a particular focus on pastoral care and discipleship.

I have a heart for enabling people to go deeper with God, so I'm excited about the potential the Quiet Garden at Acomb has as a space for prayer and reflection. As part of my role, I'll be looking to help develop quiet days and retreat spaces using the garden, drawing on a connection to the natural world and God's creation. I'm also starting the slightly daunting process of training to be a Local Preacher, so I hope to meet many of you around the circuit.

I'd describe my faith journey as slightly eclectic. I grew up in Stockport and was brought up in the Methodist Church, my mum being a Local Preacher and my dad

a church steward. I then studied English Literature at the University of Warwick and became heavily involved in the ecumenical chaplaincy. That led me to explore different approaches to faith and to prayer, including taking part in trips to Iona and to the Taizé Community in France. Something must have struck a chord: a year after graduating I decided to go back to Taizé for a two-week break, but ended up staying for over a year!

During that time, I sensed a call to join a religious order, and after a period of discernment, entered an Ignatian community who (amongst many other things) work alongside the Brothers of Taizé. I was with them for nearly twelve years (in Taizé, Lyon, Belgium and Paris), before hearing and discerning an even more surprising call to come "home" to the UK, which I did at the beginning of 2021.

My time with the sisters taught me a great deal. I received training in pastoral care, theology and spiritual accompaniment, and I had the joy and privilege of meeting and ministering to hundreds of young people from all over the world, all thirsty for meaning and community. But more than that, I developed a deeper understanding of what it means to be a disciple of Jesus Christ, with my gifts and vulnerabilities, walking and serving alongside others, with their gifts and vulnerabilities. I'm grateful that that journey is now continuing with you in the York Circuit.

In my leisure time, I'm an avid reader and enjoy all things artistic, particularly music and theatre. I also love walking and camping, and I've been experimenting with doing some backpacking over the summer. I look forward to getting to know people in the circuit more in the months to come.

As I write this, the weather is beautiful, and we have just entered phase 4 of the government's road out of lockdown. The bad news is that the daily number of positive Covid cases is rising rapidly, and we don't know what the future will look like with regard to the pandemic.

However, the vaccination rollout is going well and so we hope to be able to offer some in-person events alongside the now ubiquitous zoom meetings!

From September we will be alternating One X meetings, with one online (2nd Friday) and one in-person (3rd Friday) session each month.

The first **One X** of the new academic year will be on 4th September at the circuit hub. We are offering a two-hour

chill and chat (focussing on life skills) followed by lunch and then an escape room. The young people are welcome to join in for as much or as little of the day as they wish.

One Family is also moving offline, meeting on the first Friday each month 5-7pm at the Circuit hub. These sessions will include an hour and a half of activities and a light tea for the children; finishing with a half hour family worship, to which parents and carers are invited. The One X group are invited to join these sessions as young leaders, with the incentive of a hoodie! The first One Family is on 1st October.

We hope to get the **volunteer network** up and running again, meeting on the 5th October from 7pm - 9pm, with a light dinner being offered from 6pm.

We are also starting a **Young Adult Bible Study** once a month on Zoom using the Methodist Way of Life materials. This is open to 18-23 year olds who can [register by clicking this link](#).

Alongside these activities, the team are busy with more individual projects:

Amy is experimenting with different forms of intergenerational worship, if this is something you are interested in, please get in touch with her to discuss how this might fit with your church's worship pattern.

Heather is working with York Family Matters to develop parenting courses and long-term support groups, if your church would like to host one of these please let her know.

Lorraine continues to work on mental health resources and support in schools and across the circuit.

Much less exciting, **Victoria** writes articles and reports and is available if anyone would like support with risk assessments, safeguarding queries, consent forms or any other of the admin associated with children's and youth work!

CIRCUIT COUNCIL DISCUSSES “GOD IN LOVE UNITES US”



Following several years of discussion and after votes at each of the District Synods, the Methodist Conference of 2021 voted to support all of the Resolutions of the “God In Love Unites Us” report.

This was a report on marriage and relationships, with the Conference voting to confirm provisional resolutions on the principles of good relating, understanding of cohabitation and same sex marriages conducted on Methodist premises or by Methodist office-holders. Churches will be able to register to have same-sex marriages on their premises, but they are under no obligation to do so. Indeed, they can decline to consider the issue altogether.

The Circuit Council met to discuss the decisions of the Conference, and we heard how whilst different opinions were expressed both before and during the debate, the discussions were all conducted in a spirit of respect for each other’s points of view. The Council saw videos of 4 influential speakers who gave speeches from differing perspectives but which emphasised the need for unity and to respect each other. One speaker, Rev Paul Smith, said that

“we listen carefully that we might love those with whom we disagree”.

The Council reflected on its response, both in groups and in plenary. Members were grateful for the Conference speeches they saw and wondered if they could be made available to Church Councils in any discussions there. There was widespread agreement that in the

differing opinions people may have we need to be gracious with each other. Some expressed concerns that any who might disagree with the decisions of the Conference should feel pastorally supported. Others felt that Churches that wish to do so, should embrace the decisions of the Conference and move quickly to register their Churches for same-sex marriages. Still others felt that before local decisions are made, it would be important for there to be full and honest discussions.

The Council discussed whether to register Melbourne Terrace for same-sex marriages, but many felt further discussions were needed. Different Church Councils will have their own local approach to how they want to consider the issues raised by the Conference report.

As our meeting concluded, the Superintendent said that nothing can happen locally until things have been formalised nationally. In addition, we should not forget that the report was much wider than same-sex marriage and has much of value to us.

HUBY’S FACILITIES FIT FOR AN OUTWARD-FOCUSED FUTURE

At our last Quinquennial inspection we were advised that the old brick sheds and coal store at the rear of Huby’s building needed repairs. That spurred us on to develop ideas we had for improving our outreach to the community.

We decided to demolish the old buildings and, in that space, build a walk-in store room accessible from inside to accommodate all the equipment used by the toddler group, Brownies, WI and various other groups which previously cluttered the schoolroom. We made a doorway out onto a previously unused outdoor area, had the flags levelled and the fencing secured and now have a lovely sunny area for outdoor activities for the children and for our Community Café.

Our kitchen was needing a major refit, so now we have new units, a new floor AND hot water in the taps (no more carrying kettles of boiling water to the sink - how 21st century is that!).

Before we could do any of that we needed proper architect plans, then permission and, of course, money! The permission was granted and in the year we raised the £30k plus that we needed. This was through generous gift donations and grants. We were chosen by the local Co-op to be one of their first charities to be supported outside Easingwold, and our parish church, All Hallows, wonderfully supported us.

Then Covid struck and the Chapel was closed.

However, as the year progressed our builder was able to start the work, the kitchen was installed and now as restrictions are relaxed we are ready to press GO!

We believe that none of this would have happened without prayer, and looking back we feel that the Spirit has been with us on this journey- urging, encouraging, enabling.


EXPLORE 'BEING INTERRUPTED'



