Advent Conversations

Dear Friends,

You may be familiar with the radio programme *Across the Red Line*, so-called because it encourages participants to look beyond the set red lines of their social and political views in order to appreciate alternative stances. Two people with somewhat differing outlooks are brought together to explore a particular question. The conversation then moves through three distinct phases. In the first part the two participants are given the opportunity to state their own convictions. Together they begin a debate which focuses primarily on the arguments they wish to use to support their point of view. In the second part they are asked to move away from presenting and defending their own angle. At this point they are expected to ask open questions of each other which explore the other's history and background, trying to understand what it is that has brought them to their current beliefs and values. It is here that much more attention is given to listening, not to the arguments,

but to one another. In the third part they are then asked to put themselves in each other's shoes and summarise how the other feels and thinks about the question at hand.

The process moves from debate to inquiry to

understanding. It moves from promoting and defending a point of view to taking a deeper interest in the other participant and then on again to articulating the stance of the other to check that it has been understood accurately. The process challenges those taking part to enter into a relationship where alternative views are recognised and understood and where each learns a little at least about the other.

Perhaps this might provide us with a framework for our travelling through Advent. Traditionally understood as a season for self-examination and reflection, Advent invites us to do this through encountering and appreciating what may feel very different and strange. A deeper valuing of others may well result in a deeper valuing of ourselves.

You might like to make a conscious effort to make conversation this Advent. It will make a difference!

Different Types of Worship

If you look at the Circuit Plan you will see there are a number of different types of worship listed, and there are more gatherings that aren't shown on the Plan. Below are a few details about some of them- why not try and see what you think?

Friday prayers at Easingwold: weekly in church 9.00am-9.30am.

A quiet prayerful time taking prayer requests from the preceding Sunday or from a 'prayer box' left in the hallway. With reference to Easingwold's own Prayer Calendar, specific members of the congregation are brought in prayer in a given week. Anyone can contribute any prayers throughout the time together

Tuesday Together at Heworth (Zoom, 9.30am-10.00am)

This is quiet reflective time with most people joining by zoom and some by phone. Prayers of adoration and thanks are shared, then followed by reflecting on things that have not gone so well for which forgiveness is sought. With reference to recent news broadcasts and to the Methodist Prayer Handbook, prayers focus on particular areas of the world and for a District and faith community within the York Circuit. With reference to Heworth's own Prayer Calendar, specific members of the congregation are brought in prayer; individuals who are unwell or have particular requests are held in quiet prayer. Anyone can contribute to any of these prayer areas as there is quite a lot of quiet space for individual prayers. The prayers are brought to a close with a prayer for the week ahead and potential God-given encounters to be noticed; and The Grace is shared before the zoom gathering is closed.

Thoughtful Thursdays at Heworth (WhyPay? *Teleconference* 9.30-9.45am)

People were initially invited to join this group because they had expressed a wish to stay in touch but were unable to access zoom gatherings. Each person has written information on the dialling in process and codes plus the initial guidance on contributing within conference calls. Whoever is leading the gathering will share an opening prayer. Participants reflect on things that they have done during the week or things that are concerning them at that moment. These thoughts and comments are turned into a short prayer or two before the conversation moves on – this pattern is repeated throughout the 15 minutes. Participants may share some of what they are going to do for the rest of the day or for the week ahead – these things are also gathered into prayers. The Grace is shared before the call is closed. Tea-time church at Lidgett

We're really pleased to be starting up our Tea-Time Church again at Lidgett. From 3.45-5pm once a month on a Thursday, families are invited to gather for a little snack, some games, a time of fellowship, cool craft and plenty of fun! Our final meeting of 2022 will be on 8th December. You are welcome to join us!

Prayer & Care at Holgate

A small group of us meet at Holgate every Thursday mornings from 10am to 12 noon for Bible study, discussion, and prayer.

We are an older group - age range 65 to 100, and take it in turn to lead. In recent weeks we have discussed - last Sunday's sermon; various hymns; Mission Aviation Fellowship; and items from the Methodist Way of Life. During Advent we will look at the Christmas story in the Gospels.

We always conclude with a prayer time in which between us we try to cover things like: The work of God in this church; our Holgate Community; human, animal, plant, and insect life and climate change caused by humans; our government and world leaders; recent news items; and people we know who are in need. We end with coffee and biscuits. It is a rich time of fellowship as we get to know more about each other, our faith, and the world in which we live. Anyone is welcome to join us.

Messy church at Holgate

Holgate's Messy Church is all about exploring your faith through fun and friendship. It happens once a month and each session explores a different theme (e.g. a Bible story like Noah's Ark, or an idea such as the church being a worldwide family) but follows the same structure. We start with refreshments and colouring at 4pm, giving children and adults time to gather and catch-up with one another. Around 4.15pm, we begin our main activities which could include crafts, games, treasure hunts, competitions, painting and playdoh! People spend around 40 minutes going round different activities with the adults often having as much fun as the children! Following this, we watch a short video linked to the theme. We finish our session with a short worship which brings all the elements of the session together.

Although the young people from York circuit have not previously had a positive experience of 3Generate, the move to the NEC has been beneficial. This year the team took on the running of the Town Hall venue. This venue aims to serve as a place for debate, discussion and solution incubation; asking how do we engage in meaningful social action? The young

people and their leaders discussed real live topics, particularly current issues in the Methodist Church, and be encouraged to be an Agent of Change in their church, community and the world. We had workshops, the chance to meet young activists from across the Connexion and as a bonus we had Lego and pick and mix!



The theme for this year was 'Tune into God, the world and each other." The young people were encouraged to focus on what God might be saying to them, and how they might respond. Although we only had one young person from the circuit come with us, they really enjoyed the experience – especially the inflatable chapel!

Attending 3Generate gives the young people the opportunity to meet with others from across the Connexion, to vote for the youth president and representatives and have their voices heard. Planning for next year has already begun, and once again the circuit team will be supporting the event and we hope to inspire a larger group to join us.

As I write this, I am keeping an eye on the headlines covering the COP27 conference at Sharm el-Sheikh in Egypt. Apparently, there are 636 lobbyists from the oil and gas industries; 25% up on last year in Glasgow. This dwarfs the number of representatives from those directly affected by Climate Change. While I am incredibly frustrated that those facing the most impact are not getting their voices heard, I also smile to myself — it sounds like the fossil fuel industry is worried. They need to slow down the talks. So, in turn, we need to keep amplifying the voices of those not being heard; I am off on a bus to Sheffield to stand shoulder to shoulder with those calling out for Climate Justice. We can all take action in a way that makes sense for us. This newsletter includes some of the ways folk around York have been doing just that.

They are running a 4-session course in January through the organisation Operation Noah called 'Tenants of the King', which sounds fascinating. It will be on Tuesday nights. They are also going to be running a zoom workshop on 'Becoming a joy-fuelled climate activist' run by Jo Musker-Sherwood. It's all about avoiding burnout: the urgency of the Climate Crisis and the apparent lack of action by world leaders and businesses can cause anxiety and grief. The workshop goes through this and equips those who are taking action to be able to sustain their work and keep joyful. I have been to one of Jo's workshops before and I found it extremely helpful.

Move from despair to preparation, from alienation to kinship, from consuming to healing, from avoiding to lamenting, from resignation to gratitude, from passivity to citizenship, from indifference to attention and may we go from this sacred space and be disciples of refugia. Amen.

Never again?

Signing up for the York marathon felt like a good idea at the time. It still felt like a good idea when Bill (Topping) and I agreed to fundraise together at the January Sleepout for Homelessness, it was still a safe distance in the future.

Unlike Bill and Nick (Dawson) this would not be my first marathon, however it was the first time I had run one alone. I am not a big fan of races, so all my previous marathons were because someone else asked me to accompany them. This meant I had no training partner to motivate and hold me accountable. Many mornings I



engaged in an internal committee meeting (think Inside Out) about the wisdom/need to go and do the training, telling myself it's too cold, too difficult, too lonely, too thankless, too boring. The only reason to train being the commitment I had made to myself.

I don't think you have to run a marathon to appreciate that running for hours at a time is as much about mental outlook as it is about physical fitness. So, although Bill and I had agreed to fundraise and run together, we had made the decision not to train together. This was partly a practical decision, Bill lives in York and I live in Wetherby, and our schedules rarely coincide. However, there was a deeper reason, both of us run for our mental health as well as the physical benefits. Running contributes to my wellbeing, it gets me outside, takes me away from my phone, emails, and other responsibilities, it gives me time to think and process the events of my life.

Aside from the marathon, running is thus a huge part of my life and identity, but how does this fit with my identity in Christ?

Paul says this about running 'Do you not know that in a race the runners all compete, but only one receives the prize? Run in such a way that you may win it. Athletes exercise self-control in all things; they do it to receive a perishable garland, but we an imperishable one. So I do not run aimlessly, nor do I box as though beating the air; but I punish my body and enslave it, so that after proclaiming to others I myself should not be disqualified.' 1Corinthians 9.24-27

There are many parallels between running and a life of faith. Running literally shapes my body, regular worship, prayer and study shape me in other ways. Like a long run, life can be boring, difficult, and lonely. Often, I do not want to do the training or worship, prayer, and

study, I need to do each day. We need training partners to run with us and we need to run with others, to motivate and hold one another accountable. As well as being good for my mental health, being away from the distraction of my phone and email is good for my relationship with God. A long run offers time to wrestle with my faith and my doubts, space for meditation and prayer.

Running long distance is not easy, most of the way round the marathon I felt like giving up. It is very strange to want something so badly and yet want to quit at the same time. If it had not been for the hundreds of people lining the course cheering the runners on, I am not sure I could have kept going. These cheerleaders, the stewards who volunteer to guide the runners and the spectators who find encouraging things to say to runners they have never met are a crucial part of the journey. As are family and friends who put up with cancelled plans, accept the time sacrifice required for the training and listen to the endless (and no doubt boring!) talk about times, routes, and diet. Then there are all the people who believed in us enough to offer sponsorship. Thanks to their generosity the three of us raised over £3500 for Alzheimer's research, the Millie Wright children's charity and Carecent. Looking at the finishers medal I am grateful to all these people, like ministry a marathon is not a solo endeayour.

There is however, one huge and crucial difference between a marathon and a life of faith; the marathon is for a short time whereas a life of faith is, as the words suggest, a lifetime commitment! Unlike running the marathon this is not a commitment I make alone, or to myself. God commits to us as we commit to God. So, whilst most long-distance runners will say, every marathon feels like the last one and never again is a common refrain on the finish line, we can never say never when God is involved.

Circuit Council September 2022

- The Circuit Council discussed some of the effects of the pandemic, both on individuals and churches, including how we respond to trauma, and how some effects are continuing to affect us.
- The meeting prayed for and agreed to support Bill Topping as he goes through the process of candidating to become a deacon.
- An update on the work of the Eco Task Group was received, including setting goals for the Circuit- this is something each church should be discussing.
- Finance update: the Circuit faces serious and urgent challenges, as we are running at a deficit due to a combination of church closures, churches not meeting their assessment, and increased costs due to inflation. Staffing is the biggest cost. Our reserves will not sustain this level of deficit for more than a few years. Building sales take a long time and do not always bring in large amounts so cannot be relied on to replenish our reserves. This is a collective challenge and will be discussed further at future meetings.
- Consent was given to sell the former chapels at New Earswick and Stillingfleet, and to lease the flat above Aroma and Dunnington chapel, and to renew the lease of the former Melbourne Terrace institute building.

29th January	The church on the Circuit Prayer Rota for 29th Jan is Sheriff Hutton. Thank God and pray for the work of God in that place. "Learn to do good; seek justice" (Isaiah 1:17). How can we seek justice in our own lives, churches and communities?
5th February	The church on the Circuit Prayer Rota for 5th Feb is Southlands. Thank God and pray for the work of God in that place. "What does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?" (Micah 6:8). How do we react when issues of justice are raised? How should we react?
12th February	The church on the Circuit Prayer Rota for 12th February is Stamford Bridge. Thank God and pray for the work of God in that place. This Sunday is Racial Justice Sunday. Pray for all those who experience injustice due to racial prejudice and institutional inequalities, and for those who seek to change this.
19th February	The church on the Circuit Prayer Rota for 19th February is Strensall. Thank God and pray for the work of God in that place. This Sunday we pray for students. Pray for those who have left our congregations to study, students who attend our churches, and all those in our city who are students or work with them, especially our university chaplain John Schofield.
26th February	The church on the Circuit Prayer Rota for 26th February is Thornton-le-Clay. Thank God and pray for the work of God in that place. This Sunday is the start of Lent, where traditionally we begin to prepare for Easter by thinking about the changes we need to make to our lives. Have you made any changes over the last year that you can build on?

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Reflections

The Lectionary readings this quarter include a number of passages from Isaiah, and our reflections will look at some of these, in particular picking up on the theme of justice which ties into our prayer rota in January and February.

Swords into ploughshares

Isaiah 2 (verses 1-4):

"He will judge between the nations and will settle disputes for many peoples. They will beat their swords into ploughshares and their spears into pruning hooks. Nation will not take up sword against nation, nor will they train for war anymore."



Over the last year we've seen conflict in many places across the world, particularly in Ukraine. We see on news reports and online many stories of those who have lost loved ones, homes and livelihoods because of armed conflict. The tools and tactics may have changed, but Isaiah and ancient Israel were no strangers to the destruction of war. Isaiah says that in the days to come, God will bring about peace and resolve disputes, and that the people and resources devoted to fighting can be used instead to make the land fruitful.

Pray for all who have lost their homes or loved ones due to war or conflict. Pray for peace and fair distribution of resources so that all people may have enough.

Justice and righteousness

Isaiah 9 (verses 1-7):

"He will reign on David's throne and over his kingdom, establishing and upholding it with justice and righteousness from that time on and forever."



Thrones and kingdoms have been on our minds over the past year as we first celebrated the Queen's Platinum Jubilee and then marked her death and the accession of King Charles III. But to Isaiah the fact that the child he prophesied about would reign from David's throne was a way of saying that he would be a successor to the best of Israel's human kings, and would rule with justice as the legitimate leader of God's people. He would shatter the burdens on God's people and rule wisely.

Pray It's been a turbulent year for the political leaders of our country. Pray for justice and righteousness to be the guiding principles behind their decision making.

Judging with justice

Isaiah 11 (verses 1-9):

"He will not judge by what he sees with his eyes, or decide by what he hears with his ears; but with righteousness he will judge the needy, with justice he will give decisions for the poor of the earth.

with justice he will give decisions for the poor of the earth.

The world that Isaiah describes can sometimes seem a

long way from where we are now. This passage describes a place where the strong and the weak can live together as equals, without fear, and where justice will be done so that those who are poor aren't taken advantage of. Unfortunately in our world the gap between rich and poor is in many places getting wider rather than narrower, and factors such as skin colour, gender or background influence how people are seen and judged. God sees our genuine needs, whatever they are, and cares about them.

Pray for those who do not have the resources (for example food, clothes, a stable home) to live a flourishing life, and pray for those with the power to change this to prioritise those who most need it.

Like a candle flame

Isaiah 42 (verses 1-4):

"A bruised reed he will not break, and a smouldering wick he will not snuff out. In faithfulness he will bring forth justice; he will not falter or be discouraged till he establishes justice on earth."



Justice isn't easy. Isaiah describes God's servant as a light shining in the darkness (sound familiar?) which will not be crushed or put out. He offers hope that despite all the injustice, conflict and suffering in our world, God will eventually bring about justice.
